- 2. School Updates
 - Lansdowne currently there are approximately 12 students attending the meetings. We have created an advocacy poster campaign and have had a bake sale. Robin Stevenson, who wrote the book Pride, has attended and may attend a district GSA meeting. Our meetings are a safe and friendly place.
 - Oak Bay currently planning the next Love is Love.
 Matt was here to help with the planning which included looking at what worked and what did not work. The event is scheduled for the pro-d on February 23rd. We are looking at fundraising opportunities as well as district support.
 - Esquimalt we are hosting Out In Schools on January 10th for our grade 9 & 10 students. We are having Bake Sales as an excellent fund raiser for our GSA and are redoing our bulletin boards.

- Monterey we are a YCI group in our school supporting LGBTQ+ students that was started by a student last year. We are having bake sales as a way to fund for Camp Firefly. We continue to work on Pink Shirt Day and have booked the Learning Labs at the Royal BC Museum.
- Lambrick Park Dominic and Eryn are the co-leaders of the student run GSA with Hope as a leader in training. We have about 15 people in the group and have organized the Orange Shirt Day as well as working on Pink Shirt Day. We are using Bake Sales as a fundraiser and meet Thursdays at lunch to plan what we can do and what we want to do. We have combined with the Leadership group to look at the youth housing crisis which has a significant impact on the LGBTQ youth. Together with Shine a Light Foundation our school hopes to make a difference by selling a light on a tree for \$10. We have partnered with Gordon Head Rec Centre for a Teen Drop In see attached poster.
- Willows rainbow week is the focus of the school.
 With the development of an elementary focused group there will be more elementary opportunities.
- Glanford Sonnie Marsh is the new safe contact person and will work with the Shoreline group to cocreate activities for the school.
- PFLAG Sharon Doty representing PFLAG attended and on behalf of the Greater Victoria Library Union donated the book PRIDE to our Middle Schools.
